Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act (H.R. 6074)

With wide bipartisan support, Congress passed the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (H.R. 6201). The legislation was enacted on March 6, 2020, and provides multi-billion-dollar emergency funding measure for programs that address issues such as:

- Developing, manufacturing, and procuring vaccines and other medical supplies;
- Grants for state, local, and tribal public health agencies and organizations;
- Loans for affected small businesses;
- Evacuations and emergency preparedness activities at U.S. embassies and other State Department facilities; and
- Humanitarian assistance and support for health systems in the affected countries.

Additionally, the bill allows Medicare providers to deliver telehealth services to beneficiaries during the public health emergency at an estimated cost of nearly \$500 million to the federal government. At least 85 percent of the funds will be spent domestically.
